Our Mission and History

The Turimiquire Foundation is a U.S.-based non-profit organization that has served the low-income population of Sucre state in northeastern Venezuela since 1996. *Fundación ServYr* is our “sister” non-profit foundation established in Venezuela at the same time for executing our in-country programs. Funds raised in the U.S. and other countries by the Turimiquire Foundation are administered through *Fundación ServYr* to run our Venezuelan programs. *Fundación ServYr* also raises program funds separately within Venezuela.

Both organizations share the following objectives:

Reproductive Health and Family Planning: To support and improve education in sexual and reproductive health, and to deliver services in family planning.

Rural Education: To implement literacy and educational programs with the goal of helping the rural population improve their lives and livelihoods.

Sustainable Rural Development: To support and promote the development of eco-agricultural practices that conserve and improve the environment. These programs include alternative energy technologies, eco-agriculture, rural hygiene, animal welfare, and environmental restoration

Cultural Preservation: To preserve the culture and traditions of the rural population with an eye to honoring and conserving the *campesino* way of life.

Reproductive Health and Family Planning

The Turimiquire Foundation and *Fundación ServYr* work in collaboration with the Ministry of Health of the State of Sucre, the State Office of Gender and Women’s Affairs, the private sector, and with PROSALUD InterAmericana and PLAFAM / IPPF-WHR in Caracas. In selected public health establishments, we distribute free contraceptives and offer free family planning consultations directed by gynecologist-obstetricians. Within the private sector, we offer subsidized family planning and reproductive health consultations for low-income patients. We have offered surgical sterilizations since 1997. In 2005, we began using the less invasive laparoscopic technology that allows patients to recover and return to their daily activities more rapidly. We offer workshops on sexual and reproductive health and family planning in schools and other public venues.

Chronology of Selected Projects in Reproductive Health and Family Planning:

- 1997:** Initiation of family planning services in Cumanacoa and rural Montes County.
- 1999:** Initiation of family planning services in Cumaná and rural Sucre County.
- 2000:** Initiation of a family planning clinic in the Fe y Alegría Urban Public Health Clinic, Cumaná.
- 2002:** Establishment of the **Adolescent Orientation Center** in the Fe y Alegría Urban Public Health Clinic, Cumaná, in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and the State Office of Gender and Women’s Affairs, offering education and information on sexual and reproductive health to adolescents both within and outside of the school system.
- 2003:** Initiation of Educational Workshops on sexual and reproductive health, family planning, sexually transmitted infections and diseases, gender-based perspectives, etc., in schools and public health facilities in several counties.
- 2003:** Initiation of family planning services in the “Dr. Julio Rodríguez” Urban Public Hospital, Cumaná.
- 2005:** Adolescents who have attended our sexual responsibility workshops write and present a play titled *Nothing's Going to Happen to Me... (but it did!)* organized by the youth theater group of the nearby Culture Foundation of San Juan de Macarapana.
- 2006:** Initiation of *Pana a Pana* (Buddy to Buddy) project with the preparation of 90 adolescents in Cumaná to serve as educators and facilitators in sexual and reproductive health among their peers.
- 2007-2009:** Project financed by the State government in 2007, continuing through 2009, executed by *Fundación ServYr* for the reduction of pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections in the adolescent populations of Sucre, Montes, Ribero, Mejía, and Bolivar Counties.
- 2009:** Intensified reproductive health outreach at public health facilities along the rural Cumaná-Cumanacoa road.

General Health

We collaborate with the state Children's Foundation (*Fundación del Niño Sucre*), the Ministry of Health (*FUNDASALUD*), the Lions Club (*Club de Leones*), and the State University (*Universidad del Oriente*) in rural medical outreach programs, offering attention in the areas of pediatrics, vaccinations, family planning, tuberculosis, *chagas* disease testing, evaluation and treatment of respiratory inadequacy, and dentistry.

Rural Education

We support various educational activities in the rural areas of Barrancas-Tigre, Rio Brito, and nearby communities along the Cumaná-Cumanacoa road. We help fund and maintain the following educational programs:

- Two outlets of subsidized school supplies.
- Barrancas kindergarten, which we founded in 2001.
- *Brito-Barrancas Community Center*, library and computer facilities.
- Teacher education and school activities at the remote Río Brito elementary school.
- Scholarship Program for the Río Brito community that enables 45 rural students to continue their studies at local high schools. Six of these students who graduated from high school in 2008, are now continuing to university with Foundation support, a significant step forward for this rural community.
- Internet/Computer Center in Cumaná.

Chronology of Selected Projects in Rural Education:

- 2001:** Establishment, with the financial support of the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany, of the first **Kindergarten** and **Barrancas Community Library** in Tigre-Barrancas for students along the Cumaná-Cumanacoa road.
- 2003:** Renovation, with the financial support of the Embassy of the Netherlands, of the *Madre María* Child Care Center for the Agua Santa Community, and of the Barrancas Community Library.
- 2003:** Initiation of our **Scholarship Program** for remote rural students who wish to continue their studies in high school. There are now over 40 students participating yearly, and graduating students continuing to university with our support.
- 2004:** Installation of an **Internet/Computer Center** in *Casa ServYr*, Fundación ServYr's headquarters in Cumaná, with free access for low-income members of the rural and urban *barrio* communities for their studies and general use.
- 2004:** State University (*Universidad de Oriente*) makes a major donation of books and materials for the rural Barrancas Community Library.
- 2005:** Construction of the **School Cafeteria** for the remote Río Brito elementary school.
- 2006:** Creation of the **Brito-Barrancas Community Center** integrating a variety of programs for children, adolescents, and adults, including a staffed library, tutoring, and computer lessons; art, dance, and cultural activities; dental attention (with support of Sucre State Children's Foundation); and medical attention (with support of Sucre State Public Health Ministry).
- 2007-09:** *Fundación ServYr* and the Brito-Barrancas Community Center receive financing from the Sucre State Government for development of community programs.

Sustainable Rural Development

We work with the *campesino* populations in the rural areas of Barrancas, Rio Brito, and along the Cumaná-Cumanacoa road to help improve agriculture and rural infrastructure, and to conserve their traditions and lifestyle. We have helped to diversify local agriculture and encourage eco-agricultural practices, including the successful introduction of fruit trees from other tropical areas of the world. We support projects such as the development of carpentry using local timber from fallen and standing dead trees. We have implemented the use of solar energy and gravity-piped water delivery for remote communities off the public services grid.

Chronology of Selected Projects in Sustainable Rural Development:

- 1996-present:** Support for **Los Dos Pasos Juntos**, our experimental eco-agricultural fruit farm, and community center for the upper Río Brito valley.
- 1996-present:** Initiation of **Vaccination** campaigns for burros and other domestic animals against paralytic rabies and encephalitis with the support of the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock. These campaigns continue periodically.
- 1998:** Initiation of our **Solar Energy Program**, which installed solar electric systems in 25 houses, and the church and school of the remote Rio Brito valley; with financial support from the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany in 2001.
- 1999:** Our **experimental fruit plantings** of Jackfruit, Rollinia and various locally unknown tropical fruits begin to bear quality fruit. We begin seedling nurseries with this first generation of Venezuelan cultivars.
- 2001:** Distribution of these **tropical fruit seedlings** to nearby farmers and enthusiasts.
- 2003:** Initial use of **Brito-Barrancas Community Center** to store agricultural products in transit to the Cumaná market and for building materials for Brito valley projects, and as a care station for the community's pack animals.
- 2005:** Installation of **Gravity-piped Potable Water** for 20 valley families.
- 2006:** Installation of gravity-piped potable water for 95 additional families, using our successful system as a model, now with government funding.
- 2006:** **Carpentry Classes** at the Brito-Barrancas Community Center using ecologically-harvested local wood.
- 2007:** Our **Durian** trees begin to produce quality fruit, and we start Durian tree nurseries with first generation Venezuelan seed for future distribution of this renown fruit, relatively unknown in Venezuela and in most of South America.
- 2007-08:** **Classes** in food preparation and handicrafts at the Brito-Barrancas Community Center.
- 2009:** Distribution of **Durian seedlings** to local farmers, along with our other little known tropical fruit cultivars.
